## **Opening session**

It is a great pleasure and privilege to be here today with all of you, celebrating the 75th anniversary of the Hydraulics and Environment Department of LNEC and the birth of the LNEC Lisbon Conferences series.

The selection of the theme was collaborative and inclusive. We wanted to bring forward issues of great significance to society related to water and the environment, topics in which LNEC currently has significant activity and should continue to contribute by fostering new knowledge, promoting best practices, and acting as a catalyst for innovation. Our intention was to choose a theme that would be all-encompassing, spanning from tap to ocean, covering a wide range of natural and manmade systems, and be relevant to audiences beyond water professionals.

Our aspiration is to conclude these two days more inspired, more knowledgeable, having created more opportunities for collaboration, ideally with a handful of recommendations that will guide us at the European, national, local, and institutional levels in defining or adjusting research and innovation strategies to be implemented in the coming years. We aim to transcend the obvious and well-established strategies and fervently wish that, together with all of you, we can take a significant step toward building a more ambitious and improved future.

With the intention of not consuming too much of your valuable time during this session, I would like to conclude by addressing some practical matters for this first day and acknowledging those who made this event happen.

This morning is the time to set up the scene and start the thematic sessions with the extreme events.

Hopefully the weather is not that bad at lunch time in order to allow you to go out and enjoy the wide variety of restaurants of Alvalade neighbourhood, as lunch is not included and will be on your own.

The afternoon will feature sessions that I anticipate will be very interesting. As a concluding moment for this first day, we will have a half-hour concert of Portuguese guitar, followed by a tasting of sustainably produced white wine from Lisbon and artisanal beer produced at the Alcântara Water Factory. These are symbolic acts, meant to serve as a pretext for enjoyable conversations among all attendees.
